Concept Paper: Indigenous Business Leaders Dialogue





Problem

- Visibility: The Indigenous business sector has comparatively low visibility across the region
- Non-homogeneity: Indigenous economies are at variable stages in their economic development and business growth pipeline
- **Impediments:** Specific structural and systemic barriers to participation in the region's economy are shared or common among Indigenous economies and businesses



Solution

- Host a 2 hr dialogue between Indigenous business leaders and interested Council members to stimulate dialogue about Indigenous trade and economic policy inclusion in the region
- Develop a Statement of Economic Priorities agreed with members of the Indigenous business community which could include topics such as greater cross-border collaboration, data needs of the Indigenous Business sector and infrastructure needs of rural and remote Indigenous communities
- Seek agreement at ABAC III to include the agreed Statement as an Annex to the Leaders Report



Identifying an Indigenous Business

Globally, Indigenous peoples may be known by names such as: Tāngata Whenua, Aboriginal, First Nations, Native or Tribal peoples.

There is no official or singularly authoritative definition of Indigenous peoples under International Law or Policy.

The ABAC Indigenous Taskforce <u>does</u>
not seek to define Indigenous peoples for the purpose of identifying Indigenous businesses.

The Indigenous Taskforce seeks to work with Council members to invite participation from businesses that self-identify as Indigenous in their economies.

COMMON CHARACTERISTICS OF INDIGENOUS PEOPLES

- Self- identification as Indigenous peoples at the individual level and accepted by the community as their member
- Historical continuity with pre-colonial and/or pre-settler societies
- Strong link to territories and surrounding natural resources
- Distinct social, economic or political systems
- Distinct language, culture and beliefs
- Form **non-dominant** groups of society
- Resolve to maintain and reproduce their ancestral environments and systems as distinctive peoples and communities

Challenges



- Identifying Indigenous businesses
- Political sensitivities weighing too heavily on a business focused dialogue
- Gaining consensus to include the Statement in the Report to Leaders
- Attracting participation of Indigenous business leaders from a diversity of member economies

Opportunity




- The ABAC report provides a platform to elevate economic priority areas for the region's Indigenous business sector
- The Dialogue could help expand ABAC networks to be more inclusive of a more diverse field of business interests

Threats



- Changes in diplomatic relationships between APEC economies
- Tensions in domestic relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous populations
- Detractors that see International business forums as contrary to Indigenous interests
- Resistant economies to Indigenous economic inclusion
